The Primary Class (second through sixth grades) meets in the small classroom in Jones Hall. SUMC provides the teachers and materials for this group. Cliveden Chew Haas and Cathy Deppe are our fearless leaders.

The Primary Class curriculum for 2002-03 is *Seasons of the*



School has started. Summer will soon officially draw to a close. Community and life rhythms have changed even if our own household doesn't have children. But we notice it with traffic patterns, shopping and even television schedules! Of course, our Church life changes with the seasons too.

We've spent the summer months reflecting on our core values: spiritual growth, diversity, community, respectfulness and personal growth—what they mean and what they mean to us, how they shape who we are and how we are

shaped by them. This has been an invaluable process: grounding us in our faith tradition, steeping us with visions of *who* we are and *whose* we are. We have voiced our frustrations with the past and our hopes and visions for the future.

And it's time as they say, to return to our regularly scheduled programming. To return to a "church in life" from a "church fighting for its life". We're not putting our visioning task away—visioning is an ongoing task in all healthy churches. As one of the church planners I've worked with points out, "If you don't know where you're going, any road will get you there!" Our visioning tasks become a regular part of who we are, not special meetings held after worship.

- 1. An elementary-age youth group, to meet monthly for fun, field trips, and learning.
- 2. First Sunday "sermon talk back" time, beginning October 6th.
- 3. Monthly Sunday Lunch Bunch. Go to a restaurant or park, have lunch together.
- 4. Spiritual Growth study group, using Companions in Christ, beginning late Sept.
- 5. Cultural Diversity study group, using Charles Foster's Cultural Diversity.
- 6. Prayer Fellowship continues to meet at 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday mornings in the sanctuary. All are welcome.

Other events include an intergenerational home-building mission to Tijuana next April.

Of course, each of these activities and events needs participants and leaders. Planning and proposing is easy. Implementation takes the support of the congregation reaching out to do new things and stretching to make new things happen. Do you see something in this that speaks to you? We are rebuilding the Sunnyhills United Methodist Church to be the mission of Jesus Christ in Milpitas. Come and be a part of this exciting time in the *life* of the church.

<u>April 12-19, 2003</u>, in coordination with the Los Altos UMC, Pastor Shirley will lead an intergenerational home-building mission to Tijuana. Builders of all ages and skill levels are welcome. Participants will van-pool to Tijuana, camp in a rock quarry, build an 11'x22' home (with no power tools) in 4 days and then come home. This mission changes lives— the lives of the families we build for, and the lives of the builders themselves. Ask Shirley about her experiences on other trips. Get ready to reshape your life. The Primary Sunday School Class will visit Heifer Project International on <u>Sunday, October 13th</u>. - 1. Return to a "Church in Life" instead of a "Church under Siege" by resuming activities that nurture, such as:
 - ⇒ Youth/Children's group—monthly—to have fun, take field trips and programs, learn more about acolyting and worship assisting, do crafts, play games.
 - ⇒ First Sunday "Sermon talk back" time—an informal time after fellowship to discuss any of the previous month's messages—or other topics that may have become pertinent. First meeting: October 6th.
 - \Rightarrow Monthly Sunday Lunch Bunch. Go to a restaurant or park, have lunch together.
 - ⇒ Regular hands-on mission emphasis. In April, Pastor Shirley will lead an intergenerational home-building mission to Tijuana in coordination with the Los Altos UMC. Other hands-on mission projects to be explored.
- 2. As members and constituents committed to the continuance and growth of the Sunnyhills UMC, we will specifically invite our friends and neighbors to come to church.
- 3. Specific Study Groups that address our Core Values:
 - \Rightarrow Spiritual Growth group, using Upper Room materials *Companions in Christ*. I'll lead this 25week study, beginning late September. More details to follow.
 - ⇒ Cultural Diversity study: Start in September, to study Charles Foster's *Cultural Diversity*
- 4. Media and communications issues:
 - \Rightarrow Add SUMC worship and Sunday school times to signs at Dixon Road
 - ⇒ Add UM Igniting slogan "Open Hearts, Open Minds, Open Doors" to sign at Dixon
 - ⇒ Create attractive signs to direct visitors from both parking lots to the SUMC sanctuary and nursery
 - \Rightarrow Place press releases with *Milpitas Post* as appropriate for activities and events
- 5. Grant Writers: Monies are available from several UM organizations for development of ethnic ministries, young adult ministries, etc. A team will review available grants, determine which grants match our core values and strengths, and apply for funds.
- 6. Formalize a "mission statement" for Sunnyhills United Methodist Church such as: *The Sunnyhills United Methodist Church, an ethnically and theologically diverse, reconciling, and inclusive community, seeks to follow the example of Jesus Christ by welcoming all to walk with Christ, striving to nurture each other in Christian love, equip people with a faith that supports life in the world, and serve God in the church, the community, and the world. (Reworded from p. 35, <u>Crack</u> <u>Your Congregation's Code</u>)*
- 7. Review all above notions and plans quarterly at WRAP. Ask questions:
 - \Rightarrow Is our congregation's diversity well represented in our activities. If not, why?
 - \Rightarrow Have we invited friends and neighbors to come to church? Have they come? Why or why not?
 - \Rightarrow What's next?

Why Church Membership?

The United Methodist Church, with Open Hearts, Open Minds and Open Doors, welcomes any and all who come through those doors. So you may ask, what is the deal about membership? I've wondered that myself, especially as we approach our annual Church Conference, a time when we traditionally take a look at the

membership rolls with an eye toward whom have we lost track of and who might have found a church home elsewhere.

When I was 13, I was confirmed in membership at the First Methodist Church in Hendersonville, North Carolina. I'm sure we learned about John Wesley, the Anglican priest who is our founder of the Methodist church. I'm sure we discussed the connectional structure of the church, and learned something of what baptism meant. But the thing that stood out in my mind then and now is a promise I made when I accepted church membership. After all the Godtalk about renouncing sin, and trusting Jesus, the promise I made was to support my local church with my prayers, my presence, my gifts and my service. Over the years, when my life has been rocky, that membership vow has often kept me grounded in a faith community where I've received much more than I've been able to express.

I invite you to reflect on your membership. If you are a member of the Sunnyhills United Methodist Church, rejoice in that decision whenever it was made. If you have not made a membership decision, pray about whether you are being called to membership. We're here for you, whatever that decision is.

Welcome the Stranger

"I was a stranger and you welcomed me" (Matthew 25:35)

The invitations have been sent. You've invited your guests to dinner. You've prepared your best gourmet meal and set the table with your finest linens and flatware. You anxiously expect company to soon arrive.

But what if that was all you did? What if you made all the preparations for your guests and then let them ring the doorbell until they finally went away? Or you invited them in and then ignored them, or sat down to dinner with them and never included

Few of us would be so thoughtless or rude. Unfortunately, we seem to do it in our churches with some regularity.

October 20 is the second Laity Sunday of the 2001-2004 quadrennium. This year's theme is "Partners in Ministry—All God's People Welcoming the Stranger."

By now, we've had Igniting Ministry, **www.ignitingministry.org**, around for a while, and our United Methodist Church has used television, newspaper and billboard ads to invite people into our churches.

The people we're trying to reach with this advertising are strangers. We have extended the invitation, they see something that appeals to them, and so they come into our churches seeking something. They come wondering, "Will this church be the warm, spirit-feeding place the ads promised?"

Too often, it's not. Remember, the strangers you invite to your church are probably not United Methodists. While some will have had some church experience, others will have never stepped inside a church. If they don't find at least some of what they're looking for in their first visit, they will leave and may never come back to yours or any other church.

I have visited many churches in the United States. Some have been warm and welcoming, some have been cold and unwelcoming; but most fall somewhere in between.

Where does your church fall? If you ask people in all these churches what their church is like, most of them will tell you that theirs is a "friendly church." But that's not enough.

Your church must be actively,



intentionally and preparedly warm and welcoming. Does your church have:

- **Trained greeters** who know how to spot strangers and what to do when they encounter a stranger? Are there greeters in the parking lot?
- A cadre of trained ushers and a system that ensures there will be enough of them for every worship service? Do they simply pass out bulletins, or do they actually engage people? Are they also trained to spot strangers and what to do when they meet a stranger?
- Laypersons who make follow-up contact with first-time visitors?
- A system to connect people to small groups in your church? Are you adding small-group experiences in your church? Are you prepared for the stranger who has no church experience?

It is important to do a good job of welcoming strangers and connecting them somewhere in the congregation. It doesn't just happen. It takes hard work, training and the involvement of all members.
