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## **Pastor's Letter**

School has started, Labor Day is passing and autumn is just around the corner. I don't know about you, but I'm not sure where the summer went as it flew by! I had a whole stack of books I was going to read this summer. I remember summers in the past (maybe in the distant past!) when I got a lot of reading done, and some part of me still plans to catch up with reading in the summer months. Most of those books still sit in a pile—some on my desk at church, some on my desk at home waiting for my attention. I have read some amazing things, though this summer most of them have been on my computer.



I use my computer and electronic mail quite a bit. I got an email message recently that I thought I'd share. Evidently, some social scientists and statisticians got together and compiled some statistics on activities, accidents and safety:

- automobiles are responsible for 20% of all fatal accidents.
- ✤ 17% of all fatal accidents occur in the home.
- ✤ 14% of all fatal accidents occur to pedestrians
- ✤ 16% of all fatal accidents involve travel by air, rail, or water
- of the remaining 33%, 32% of all deaths attributed to accidents occur in hospitals
- fewer than .001% (one one-hundredth of one percent) of all accidental deaths occur during worship services

What does this mean? Clearly, that the safest place to be on Sunday morning is in church! Now, I don't take these unattributed statistics too seriously, even though I seriously believe the best place to be on Sunday morning is in church! Worship is the place to sing, to praise God, to lift your voice in thanksgiving, to listen to the Word, and last but certainly not least, to be with friends and community.

If you've been away, make a point of getting back to worship in September. Join us for special music adventures, for a time to be in community in worship, and in fellowship with old and new friends. All of our classes are using the Exploring Faith curriculum from the United Methodist affiliated Cokesbury publishers this year. One feature of this approach is that all age groups will study the same Bible stories in their weekly lessons, each geared to their own age group. Siblings in different classes can compare notes after class, and parents can discuss the stories with all their children. The Fall curriculum begins with stories of God's love: Ruth, Boaz, Hosea, 1 Corinthians, and 1 John, and then moves on to the building of the nation of ancient Israel with Hannah, Samuel, Saul, and David.



The Bible is one long, wonderful, love letter to us from God. Through the Bible we see how God called us "good" from the moment we were created. We see how God interacted with the Hebrew people, reprimanding them when necessary, but loving them always. In the Bible we find the ultimate sign of love: God's gift to us of Jesus Christ. And in the Bible we hear that God will always be with us, through the person of Jesus Christ and the presence of the Holy Spirit. We can have faith that God will be present, no matter what the future holds.

Parents, look for your Exploring Faith with Families newsletter each quarter including information on the units and themes, church and home connections, and family activities. Help your child(ren) to be present in Sunday School each week. The classrooms are prepared, the curriculum is in hand, and the teachers have planned each class. All we need now are the students!

Friends and visitors are always very welcome in Sunday School. We plan for extras—bring yours along!



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The goal of this initiative, begun in 1996, is "To lead the United Methodist Church to a transforming response to the reality of God's presence and ministry with the world's children." It sounds lofty and perhaps even so vague that it cannot be met. This summer, however, more than 500 children had daily, one-on-one reading time with United Methodist volunteers in churches across Dallas. The kids received a hot lunch. And, they learned about Jesus. Project Transformation, a program of the North Texas Annual Conference, is one among many examples of how conferences and churches are responding creatively to the United Methodist Council of Bishops' Initiative on Children and Poverty. Programs to design and implement new, innovative, and creative strategies for listening, discerning, and responding to children and the impoverished in our midst are funded through grants from this initiative to local churches and conferences throughout United Methodism.
