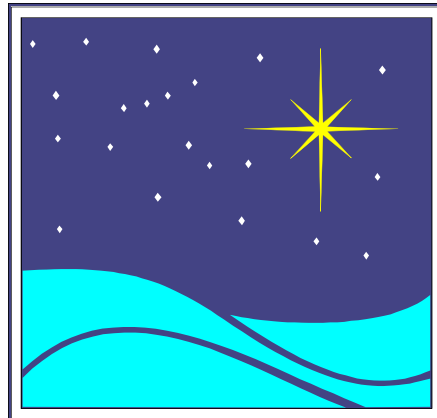

Bring a Friend!

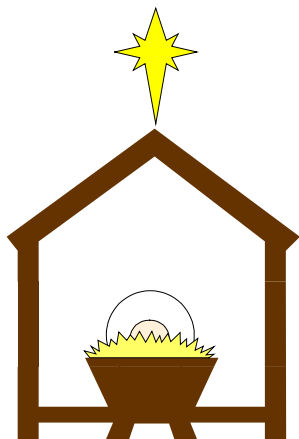
Sunday—December 14th—6:30-8:30 p.m.

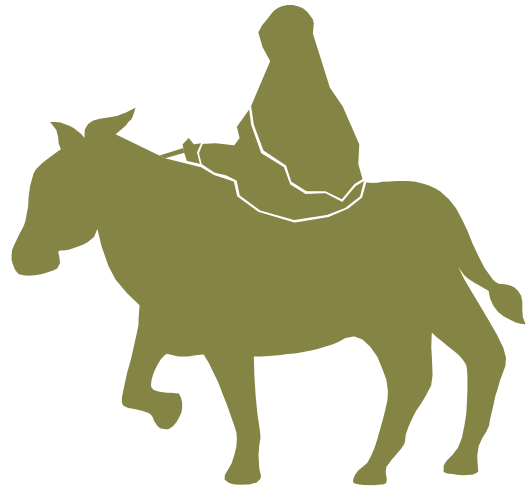
Advent can be an antidote to that commercial pull. Advent can help us put on the brakes, turn from the throne of the shopping mall and prepare our hearts for Christmas.

Business items for December include winter programming, 2004 budget and officers, and the Annual Church Conference.

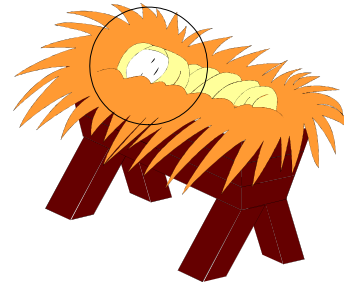
Please bring a dish to share and enjoy table fellowship at the potluck, then help us organize our life as a Christian fellowship at the planning meeting.

Scripture reading, singing, praise, and worship bring Christmas alive. Welcome Christ into your Christmas!

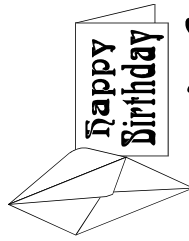


Share Your Family Crèche in Worship

Our local food pantry prepares more than 300 family food baskets for homeless, unemployed, and needy families and individuals in our area, distributing food supplies during the holidays and all through the year. The Milpitas Food Pantry has been lending a helping hand to hungry families in Milpitas and Alviso since the mid-1950s. At one time it was housed in our own Sunnyhills UMC.

Sunday—December 14th

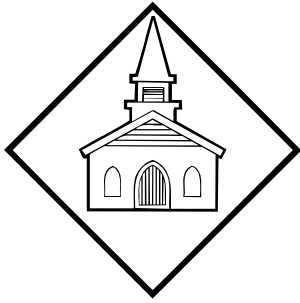

I would like about five other people to join with me in doing this. Consider it my

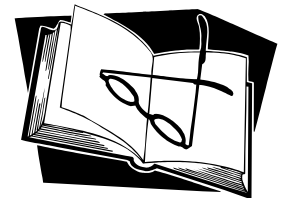
challenge to you, and my recommendation for a New Year's resolution.

Simple Night, Holy Night

Scaled-Down Plans Help Elevate the Holy

Finding fewer blessings amid the holiday bustle? This year, slow down, spend less money, and devote more time to prayer, personal time, and projects that matter.

Keep your priorities in view. Pull out your calendar early in the season. Sit with whoever is important in your decision-making process: your family, your significant other, your social group. Together decide the priorities of the season. How will you honor your faith traditions? How will you stay in touch with each other in this crazy time? Which events are important to you and which can you skip? What are the financial implications of the season? How will you honor your faith tradition in your spending?

Make spiritual life central. Schedule time for a special service project or allot a special financial gift to your church/favorite charity. Set aside time every day for prayer, Advent reading, or quiet time with friends or family. Fit your other holiday events around these priorities.

Give to those in need. Decide on an amount and set it aside each day. It could be twenty five cents, five dollars, or whatever is right between you and God. Donate the total to mission. Ask children to pick one item from their own Christmas list to give to children at domestic violence or homeless shelters. Work with local agencies to shop for individuals and families in need during the holidays.

Exchange homemade gifts or gifts of time. Exchange jars of your best homemade soup or soup mix at your Christmas parties. Bake cookies and host a swap for your prayer group. Donate yard work to an elderly friend or baby sit for a single parent or couple who need a getaway.
